		<p><b>NARRATION</b></p> <p>2 minutes max</p>	<p><b>In 1909 Saskatoon was chosen as the location for the University of Saskatchewan. 1300 acres on the east side of the South Saskatchewan river was designated for the development site; 1000 acres for agricultural land and 300 acres for the campus buildings. Montreal Architects Brown &amp; Valance created the first master plan for the campus. A year later the sod was turned for the construction of the first campus building.</b></p> <p>English Landscape architect Thomas Mawson contributed to the landscape planning in 1911. It was not until 1922 that portions of this landscape architecture plan began to unfold shortly after Dr. Cecil Patterson was hired as a lecturer in the department of horticulture. Dr. Patterson was responsible for establishing nurseries and test gardens and the planting and maintenance of the university grounds from 1922 to 1948. It was during this time that the open prairie site began to see a transformation into a campus of green spaces, trees and the results of Patterson's renowned fruit breeding program.
